Paul,

a servant of <u>Jesus Christ</u>,

called to be an apostle,

set apart for the gospel of God,

which he promised beforehand through his prophets <u>2</u> in the *boly* scriptures, 3 concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power <u>4</u> according to the spirit of holiness by (from) resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship <u>5</u> to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, including yourselves who are called to belong to <u>Jesus Christ</u>, <u>6</u>

To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints:
 Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.
